THE FULBRIGHT ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The Fulbright Alumni Association was born in Philadelphia on the 27th of February, 1977. The idea for the Association sprouted amidst the reunions held in April and May of 1976 to celebrate the nation's Bicentennial and the Thirtieth Anniversary of the Fulbright program. These reunions were held at conferences under the auspices of the Board of Foreign Scholarships, which supervises the Fulbright programs of mutual educational and cultural exchange, assisted by cooperating bodies public and private.

A strong conviction grew out of these encounters among former Fulbrighters that their experiences abroad had enabled them to acquire insights and contacts of a kind which were potentially valuable to the larger society. It was also felt that their insights and contacts had gone largely untapped.

Our initial concern was to build our membership, so that together we Fulbrighters could become a useful constituency. About twelve hundred Fulbrighters have joined the Association already. We need all of the other Fulbrighters. Each member should recruit others, and each year's new grantees should be welcomed to swell and rejuvenate our ranks.

More than 120,000 leaders in government, business, media, the arts, the professions, and the academic community from all over the world since 1946 have participated in the Fulbright programs administered by the Board of Foreign Scholarships. Over 41,000 Americans and nearly 80,000 foreign scholars from over one hundred other countries have been Fulbrighters. The benefits of their exchanges to public and private life, as well as to global peace and understanding, are as difficult to dispute as they are to assess. We need to enroll as many of them as we can to enrich the Association's efforts to carry on for future generations the programs which have benefitted us all.



We salute former United States Senator J. William Fulbright, the Honorary Chairman of the Fulbright Alumni Association, whose name we have proudly adopted. The grants program his legislation introduced is now part of everyday language. As Fulbrighters, we carry his program's badge of distinction. President John F. Kennedy asserted that we Fulbrighters have all been made part of "the classic modern example of beating swords into plowshares." We seek to do as well for future generations as Senator Fulbright did for us.

Our First Annual International Convention to which you are being urged to come affords us the opportunity we have been seeking to relive and revitalize the Fulbright experience.

Regional chapters are encouraged to arrange meetings of their own at the convention.
