

DIRECTIONS AND ACCOMMODATIONS

1. FROM PHILADELPHIA INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

Take Bennett limousine directly to the campus (about \$8: 35 to 40 minutes), or taxi (about \$25). Or, take SEPTA bus from airport to 30th Street Station. Or, take airport limousine to Penn Center station (Suburban station). Follow instruction 2 for reaching Bryn Mawr by train. Time from the airport to Penn Center station: 20-30 minutes.

2. BY TRAIN FROM PHILADELPHIA OR PAOLI

Via the Paoli Local to Bryn Mawr (20 to 25 minutes), with a short walk to the campus (8 minutes).

3. FROM THE PENNSYLVANIA TURNPIKE

Exit 24 (Valley Forge Interchange), to I 76-East ("Expressway to Philadelphia") . . . after 3 miles, leave I 76 at Gulph Mills, taking PA 320 South (Gulph Rd. becomes Montgomery Ave.) . . . continue on Montgomery Ave. (4 miles) to Morris Ave. . . . turn left (north) on Morris Ave. and left again after 1 block onto Yarrow St. (Distance: 8 miles/25 minutes).

4. FROM CENTER-CITY PHILADELPHIA

Take Schuylkill Expressway (I 76-West) westward to Exit 41 (about 4 miles): U.S. 1-South - City Ave. Turn right (west) at U.S. 30: Lancaster Ave. Turn right at the Bryn Mawr Trust Co. in Bryn Mawr. Follow traffic pattern under railroad onto Morris Ave. continuing across Montgomery Ave. Turn left onto Yarrow St. (30 minutes).

5. FROM NEW JERSEY TURNPIKE

Coming from North of Philadelphia, leave N.J. Turnpike at Exit 6 (Pennsylvania Turnpike). Join the Pennsylvania Turnpike, driving west to Exit 24 (Valley Forge). See instruction 3 to reach the college.

Coming from South of Philadelphia, leave N.J. Turnpike at Exit 3 (Camden-Woodbury). Cross Walt Whitman Bridge. Take Schuylkill Expressway to Exit 41: U.S. 1 - South - City Ave. See instruction 4 to reach the college.

6. FROM THE SOUTH VIA I-95

Exit onto PA 320 North. Turn right onto Bryn Mawr Ave. into Bryn Mawr. (15 miles: 35-40 minutes). See instruction 4 to reach the college.

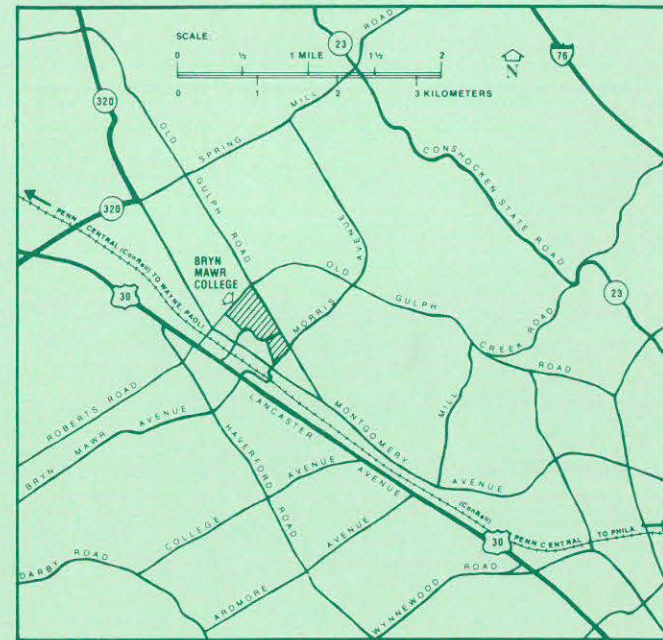

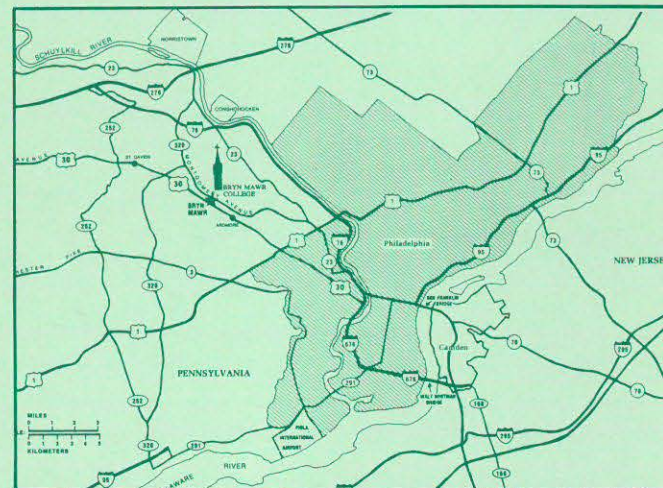

NEW PRESSURES, POLITICS AND PROSPECTS

The Fulbright Alumni Association's Fourth Annual Meeting will take place on the campus of Bryn Mawr College at Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, on Saturday, September 19, 1981. Here the Association was organized by its founders during the Bicentennial of 1976, and here the headquarters offices are located.

The Meeting's theme of "New Pressures, Politics, and Prospects" addresses the problem of the serious decline in aid for international exchange programs.

Government-sponsored programs for sending U.S. scholars abroad and for supporting foreign scholars in this country have been eaten away by inflation and budget cuts for more than a decade. There are now fewer than two-thirds of the number of exchanges that there were in 1965.

In addition, the decline of foreign language and international studies in U.S. schools and universities has scarcely abated. Yet the pressures imposed on the American people by diverse cultures and revolutionary philosophies increase by leaps and bounds. The rapidly changing nature of world relations from Central America to the Middle East to the Orient causes growing concern on the part of informed men and women everywhere.

The chronic failure of authorities to draw upon Fulbrighters and others experienced in living, studying, and teaching in other countries wastes one of the nation's most precious human resources.

The goal of this year's Fourth Annual Meeting is to provide the participants with a forum to address the issues confronting international educational and cultural exchange programs.

KEYNOTE SESSION

Dr. Rose Lee Hayden will be the keynote speaker. Dr. Hayden is the Executive Director of the National Council on Foreign Language and International Studies. Dr. Hayden formerly was Staff Director for Government Exchange Policy, United States International Communication Agency, and

earlier Deputy Director of the Peace Corps for Latin America and the Caribbean region.

President Marjorie Gardner will deliver "A Challenge to Fulbrighters" following Dr. Hayden's address.

Advocacy Task Forces will thereupon assess the current relationships of Fulbright and other exchanges to Business, the Community, Education, Politics, and Research.

Workshops in the afternoon will be led by facilitators. Efforts will be directed toward defining opportunities, policies, and responsibilities appropriate for former Fulbrighters to recognize and support in interacting with Business, the Community, Education, Politics, and Research.
