Biography

G. Ann Stamp Miller received her Ph.D. in European history from the University of Hawaii. She has lived and studied abroad in Germany and Austria. She was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to teach in Germany in 2005-2006 at Friedrich Schiller University and Technical University in Dresden. Miller is the author of the book *The Cultural Politics of the German Democratic Republic: The Voices of Wolf Biermann, Christa Wolf, and Heiner Mueller*. Professor Miller is an associate professor of European history at Simpson University in California, where she teaches Historiography, Nazi Germany, Modern Europe and Cold War Politics and History.
